WHAT IS THE TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM?

The Transportation Improvement

Program (TIP) maps out five years of funding for transportation projects in the Boston region.

Each year, the Boston Region

Metropolitan Planning

Organization (MPO) decides how to spend approximately \$130–160 million in federal funding (called Regional Target funding) to complement state and

local transportation infrastructure

investments in the Boston region.

FUNDING TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS—TIP

The Boston Region MPO TIP includes:

- · MPO-prioritized projects based on the MPO's goals and investment programs
- · Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT)-prioritized projects
- Transit projects for the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA), MetroWest Regional Transit Authority (MWRTA), and Cape Ann Transportation Authority (CATA)

The MPO decides which projects to fund using a variety of <u>quantitative and qualitative criteria based on the MPO's six goal areas</u>. These criteria assess how projects support equity, improve air quality and the environment, increase safety for different modes, promote economic development, improve mobility, and preserve and modernize existing infrastructure. Scores based on those criteria are balanced with considerations related to the project's investment program category, readiness for construction and cost, and the availability of funding. The MPO recently updated the criteria used to assess projects. To learn more about these changes, visit the TIP Criteria Development webpage.




WHAT TYPES OF PROJECTS DOES THE MPO FUND?

The MPO prioritizes investments that focus on

- preserving, maintaining, and modernizing the transportation system;
- providing safe transportation for all modes;
- enhancing livability, economic vitality, and equity; and
- · improving mobility throughout the region.

These investments fund projects like Complete Streets construction, intersection improvements, shared-use path expansion, transit enhancements, and pedestrian infrastructure improvements that align with the MPO's vision, goals, and objectives established in the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), Destination 2040.



WHAT TYPES OF PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS DOES THE TIP FUND?

The Boston Region MPO Investment Programs guide MPO decision making and help municipalities understand MPO priorities.



HOW DOES THE MPO DEVELOP THE TIP?

For a project to be eligible for inclusion in the TIP, it must be approved by the MassDOT Project Review Committee. Information on this process is available on MassDOT's project initiation web page.

OCTOBER
AND
NOVEMBER

- MPO staff contact municipalities to confirm municipal representatives (also known as <u>TIP contacts</u>) who will provide information to municipalities on how to seek project funding, and to pass along information during the TIP process.
- MPO staff gather input from the TIP contacts on new and existing projects being considered for funding, known as the Universe of Projects.
- MPO staff engage the public to gather input on proposed projects.

Municipalities submit project information for MPO project evaluations.

DECEMBER

JANUARY AND FEBRUARY

- MPO staff complete and release initial project evaluations, and continue to gather public input on proposed projects.
- Municipalities submit feedback on staff project evaluations.
- MPO staff present comments on initial evaluations and updated results based on municipal feedback.

MARCH

- The MPO board discusses the status updates of TIP projects programmed in prior years to see if they are on track or if changes need to be made to project schedules.
- The MPO board discusses staff recommendations for new project programming and selects a draft list of projects to fund.

The MPO board votes to release the draft TIP for a 21-day public comment period.

APRIL

MAY

- MPO staff conduct outreach to hear feedback from the public on the TIP.
- The MPO board endorses the final TIP at the end of the public comment period after reviewing and considering all feedback.

MPO staff gather feedback about the TIP process and projects to prepare for the next funding cycle.



FFYs 2024–28 TIP Outcomes


- \$150 million in funding allocated to 21 new projects in FFYs 2024–28
 - Three new Transit Modernization projects
 - Introduction of a FFY 2025 Project Design Pilot
 - Introduction of a Bikeshare Support Program
- Eight projects delayed, zero accelerated
- Continued investment in major regional projects
 - 606226: Boston- Reconstruction of Rutherford Avenue
 - 607981: Somerville- McGrath Boulevard Construction
 - 609246: Lynn- Rehabilitation of Western Avenue



FFYs 2024–28 TIP Target Funding by MPO Investment Program

















- Provide a supplemental public transportation resource following the conclusion of traditional fixed-route service
