 - Addition of three projects from the FFYs 2023–27
 STIP into the FFYs 2024–28 TIP for project readiness

Changes in Response to Member and Proponent Feedback

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Project Scoring Tweaks

Resilience

- Changed emphasis to extreme temperature events
- Previously extreme heat only
- Changes will be reflected in other investment programs

Access and Connectivity

- Equity multiplier for pedestrian connections, more weight
- No changes in point allocations

Transportation Equity



that eliminate transportation-related disparities borne by people in disadvantaged communities. An equity multiplier is applied to criteria that the MPO has identified through public outreach and data analysis as critical transportation needs or where there exist disparities that negatively impact equity populations. These criteria are denoted by a check mark on the right side of this scorecard. Each project's multiplier is based on the percent of the population in the project area that belongs to each of the MPO's six equity populations in the project area relative

Goal: Facilitate an inclusive and transparent transportation-planning process and make investmen

to their region wide averages. The higher the share of equity populations in the project area, the higher the multiplier. To calculate a final Transportation Equity score, a project's raw equity multiplier is scaled to 20 points and then added to the base score (out of 80 possible points) as shown at the bottom of this scorecard.



Between 2021 and 2025, Boston Region MPO programmed nearly \$115 million towards transit capital projects

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Transit Transformation Approach

Envisioning two classes of projects in future scenarios

○ Set-aside Pool

- \$250,000-\$4 million, near-term projects
- Fits within advance allocation in TIP
- \$2.5 million in federal fiscal year 2025
- \odot Large capital
 - Moderate scale capital projects, as historically supported by MPO
 - Scored alongside other projects, but likely funded in outer years if funding is available

Task 2: Development of the Transit Transformation Investment Program

- Develop a Universe of Projects for the Transit Transformation program
